1. In terms of applicable circulars issued by Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) from time to time including latest general Circular No. 03/2025 dated 22nd September, 2025 ("MCA Circulars") and Securities and Exchange Board of India ("SEBI") vide its Master Circular No. HO/49/14/14(7)2025-CFD-POD2/I/3762/2026 dated January, 30, 2026 ("SEBI Circulars"), have permitted companies to conduct AGM through Video Conferencing (VC) or other audio-visual means (OAVM), subject to compliance of various conditions mentioned therein. In compliance with the aforesaid MCA Circulars and SEBI master Circulars and the applicable provisions of Companies Act, 2013 and rules made there under, and SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, ("SEBI Listing Regulation), the 39th AGM of the Company is being convened and conducted through VC/OAVM Facility, which does not require physical presence of Members at a common venue. 2. The attendance of the Members attending the AGM through VC/OAVM will be counted for the purpose of ascertaining the quorum under Section 103 of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act).
3. **Electronic dispatch of notice and annual report:** In compliance with the aforesaid MCA and SEBI circulars, physical copies of the financial statements (including Board's Report, Auditor's Report or other documents required to be attached therewith) for the Financial Year ended 31st March, 2026 pursuant to Section 136 of the Act and Notice calling the AGM pursuant to Section 101 of the Act read with the Rules framed there under are being sent only in electronic mode to those Members whose e-mail addresses are registered with the Company/R&STA or the Depositories. The Company will not be dispatching physical copies of such statements and Notice of AGM to any Member. A Member can request for a physical copy of the Report by sending an e-mail to the Company at compliance@simranfarms.com. Further as per amended Regulation 36 of SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, a letter which providing the weblink including the exact path, where complete details of Annual Report are available, will be sent by the Registrar and Share Transfer of the Company to those shareholders who have not registered their email address(es), at their address registered with the Company.

To support the 'Green Initiative', Members who have not yet registered their email addresses are requested to register the same with their DPs in case the shares are held by them in electronic form and with the Company/R&STA in case the shares are held by them in physical form after complying due procedure.
4. 5. **A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE MEETING IS ENTITLED TO APPOINT A PROXY/ PROXIES TO ATTEND AND VOTE INSTEAD OF HIMSELF/HERSELF. SUCH A PROXY/ PROXIES NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY.**

Since the 39th AGM of the Company will be convened through VC/ OAVM, where there will be no physical attendance of members, the requirement of appointment of proxies pursuant to the provisions of Section 105 of the Act has been dispensed with and requirements of Regulation 44(4) of SEBI Listing Regulations. Accordingly, route map, attendance slip and proxy form will not be annexed to this Notice.

6. Pursuant to the provisions of Sections 112 and 113 of the Act, corporate/Institutional member can authorize their representatives to attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and cast their votes through e-voting. Provided a scan copy (PDF) of the Board Resolution authorizing such representative to attend the AGM of the Company through VC/OAVM on its behalf and to vote through remote e-voting shall be sent to the Scrutinizer through the registered email address of the member(s) at Injoshics@gmail.com with a copy marked to the Company at compliance@simranfarms.com.
7. The Statement as required under Section 102 of the Act setting out material facts concerning the business with respect to Item Nos. 3 to 6 forms part of this Notice is annexed hereto.

As per the provisions of Clause 3.A.II of the General Circular No. 20/ 2020 dated May 5, 2020, the matters of Special Businesses as appearing at Item Nos. 3 to 6 of the accompanying Notice, are considered to be unavoidable by the Board and hence forming part of this Notice.
8. In terms of the Article of Association of the Company read with Section 152(6) of the Companies Act 2013, Mr. Gurmeet Singh Bhatia (DIN: 00401697) is liable to retire by rotation at the ensuing Annual General Meeting and being eligible offer himself for re-appointment. Although he is Whole Time Director, his term is fixed and shall not break due to this retirement. The Board of the Directors of the Company recommends his re-appointment.
9. The relevant details, pursuant to Regulations 36(3) of the SEBI Listing Regulations and Paragraph 1.2.5 of the Secretarial Standards-2 on General Meetings issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India, in respect of Directors seeking re-appointment/retire by rotation at the AGM are provided as an annexure to the Notice, forms integral part of this notice. Requisite declarations have been received from Director(s) for seeking re-appointment.
10. The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has mandated the submission of Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in securities market. Members holding shares in electronic form are, therefore, requested to submit their PAN to their Depository Participants with whom they are maintaining their demat accounts and securities holders holding securities in physical form should submit their PAN and Bank account details to the RTA.
11. Members who hold shares in dematerialized form and want to provide/change/correct the bank account details should send the same immediately to their concerned Depository Participant(s) and not to the Company. Members are also requested to give the MICR Code of their bank to their Depository Participant(s). The Company will not entertain any direct request from such Members for change of address, transposition of names, deletion of name of deceased joint holder and change in the bank account details.
12. Members who are holding shares in physical form are advised to submit particulars of their PAN details, e-mail address, Mobile Number, bank account, viz. name and address of the branch of the bank, MICR code of the branch, type of account and account number etc. to our Registrar and Share Transfer Agent in prescribed Form ISR-1 quoting their folio number and enclosing the self-attested supporting document and other forms pursuant to SEBI Master Circular No. HO/38/13/(4)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated 06 February 2026.
13. Members who still hold share certificate(s) in physical form are advised to dematerialize their shareholding to avail the benefits of dematerialisation, which includes easy liquidity since trading is permitted in dematerialised form only, electronic transfer and elimination of any possibility of loss of documents. Any requests for transfer of securities are not permitted unless the securities are held in dematerialised form with a depository. Members may please note that pursuant to Regulation 40 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015, as amended, transfer of securities is

permitted only in dematerialised form, except under the special window open from 05 February 2026 to 04 February 2027 for re-lodgment of physical transfer deeds executed prior to 01 April 2019.

Further, SEBI vide Circular No. SEBI/HO/MIRSD/MIRSD_RTAMB/P/CIR/2022/8 dated January 25, 2022 and further amended vide its Circular No. HO/38/13/(3)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/3763/2026 dated 30 January 2026, has mandated the listed companies to issue securities in dematerialized form only while processing service requests such as issue of duplicate securities certificate; claim from unclaimed suspense account; renewal/ exchange of securities certificate; endorsement; sub-division/splitting of securities certificate; consolidation of securities certificates/folios; transmission and transposition. Members may note that service requests shall be processed only after the folio is KYC compliant. Accordingly, Members holding shares in physical form are advised to dematerialise their shareholdings at the earliest.

14. SEBI vides its Master Circular No. HO/38/13/(3)2026-MIRSD-POD/I/4298/2026 dated 06 February, 2026 introduced common and simplified norms for processing investor's service request by Registrar and Transfer Agent(s) (RTAs) and norms for furnishing PAN, KYC details and Nomination. Accordingly, the RTA cannot process any service requests or complaints received from the holder(s) / claimant(s), till PAN, KYC and Nomination documents / details are updated. The Company has sent individual letters to all the Members holding shares of the Company in physical form for furnishing the aforesaid details. This communication was also intimated to the Stock Exchange and available on the website of the Company. In view of this requirement and to eliminate all risks associated with physical shares and for ease of portfolio management, Members holding shares in physical form are once again requested to update their KYC details (through Form ISR-1, Form ISR-2 and Form ISR-3, as applicable) and consider converting their holdings to dematerialized form. Members can download Forms to make their service request with RTA from link <http://www.simranfarms.com/kyc.html> or contact the Company's Registrar and Transfer Agent for assistance in this regard.
15. As per the provisions of Section 72 of the Act, the facility for making a nomination is available for the Members in respect of the shares held by them. Members who have not yet registered their nominations are requested to register the same by submitting Form No. SH-13. If a Member desires to cancel the earlier nomination and record a fresh nomination, he may submit the same in Form SH-14. Members who are either not desiring to register Nomination or would want to opt out, are requested to fill and submit Form No. ISR-3. The said forms can be downloaded from the RTA website at <http://ankitonline.com>. Members are requested to submit the said form to their DP in case the shares are held in electronic form and to the RTA in case the shares are held in physical form, quoting their folio no.
16. Members holding shares in physical form, in identical order of names, in more than one folio are requested to send to the Company or RTA, the details of such folios together with the share certificates along with the requisite KYC Documents for consolidating their holdings in one folio. Requests for consolidation of share certificates shall be processed in dematerialized form only.
17. SEBI vide Circular no. SEBI/HO/OIAE/ OIAE_IAD-1/P/CIR/2023/131 dated 31st July 2023 (updated as on August 04, 2023) has specified that a shareholder shall first take up his/her/their grievance with the listed entity and/ or its RTA, as per the SEBI Directives, by lodging a complaint directly with the concerned listed entity and if the grievance is not redressed satisfactorily, the shareholder may, in accordance with the SCORES guidelines, escalate the same through the SCORES Portal in accordance with the process laid out therein. SFL requires various poultry feed ingredients and finished poultry feed on a large scale for its poultry business. SAPL operates a new automatic manufacturing and processing plant of Soya DOC and poultry feed. In ordinary course of business SFL sells maize and premix to SAPL and purchase poultry feed manufactured by SAPL which

is fine and best quality as compared to the market and having excellent protein ratio for better bird quality and increase the strength the bird. Further manufacturing plant is nearby by the poultry farms which save the transportation cost. On account of established relationship between the Company and SAPL has resulted in operational convenience and cost optimization besides assurance of product quality and yield to the satisfaction of SFL. Considering the prevailing market trend, these transactions are expected to continue in the future.

The Board of Directors based on recommendation of the Audit Committee of the Company, at its meeting held on 13th August, 2026, has approved proposal to enter into related party transactions with Simran Agritech Private Limited, a Related Party within the meaning of Section 2(76) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") and Regulation 2(1)(zb) of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations") subject to the approval of the Members wherever applicable.

The proposed transactions will be undertaken in the ordinary course of business and on an arm's length basis, in accordance with prevailing market terms and commercial considerations. The Board is of the view that these arrangements will strengthen operational synergies between the parties, improve capacity utilization, enhance business efficiencies, expand market reach and contribute to higher sales and profitability of the Company. Accordingly, the Board considers the proposed transactions to be in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders.

The aggregate value of the proposed transactions with SAPL during the financial year 2026-27 is expected to exceed the materiality threshold prescribed under Regulation 23 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, being 10% of the annual consolidated turnover of the Company as per its last audited financial statements for the financial year ended March 31, 2026. Accordingly, approval of the Members by way of an Ordinary Resolution is required under Regulation 23 of the SEBI Listing Regulations, the Company's Policy on Materiality of and Dealing with Related Party Transactions, and other applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made thereunder.

1.2 OPERATIONAL AND STATE OF AFFAIRS OF THE COMPANY

The Company is engaged in the business of integrated poultry and poultry farming. The company is mainly focused on integration and consolidation of poultry activities and has arranged large manufacturing set-up

for production of poultry feed for self-consumption. Company is an integrated company with expertise across the poultry value chain and its management has vast experience in the poultry industry.

The Company's performance during Financial Year 2025-26 on a standalone and consolidated basis were as follows –

A. On Standalone basis

During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Company has achieved total income of INR 87,718.38 Lakhs as against INR 83,624.22 Lakhs in the previous year. Further, the Company earned a net profit (Before Comprehensive Income) of INR 494.55 Lakhs as compared to INR 579.50 Lakhs in the previous year.

The increase in total income reflects continued growth in the Company's business operations and sustained demand for its products. However, the net profit witnessed a marginal decline during the year, primarily on account of increased operating costs and input expenses, which impacted overall profitability despite higher revenue. Nevertheless, the Company continued to focus on operational efficiency and optimum utilization of resources to maintain stable financial performance. The management remains committed to strengthening operational processes, enhancing productivity, and pursuing sustainable growth while effectively addressing market challenges.

B. On Consolidated basis

During the year under review, total income on consolidated basis was INR 87,719.02 Lakhs in comparison to INR 83,624.22 Lakhs in previous year. Further, the Company earned a profit (Before Comprehensive Income) of INR 508.77 Lakhs against profit of INR 589.62 Lakhs in previous year.

2. ANNUAL RETURN

During the financial year 2025-26, the Board of Director in its meeting held on 30th March, 2026 approved allotment of 10,18,300 equity shares of the company at a price of INR 155/- each (including premium of INR 145/- each) upon conversion of 10,18,300 share warrants on exercise of conversion option by warrant holders, on receipt of the remaining 75% of the consideration amount of INR 11,83,77,375 (Rupees Eleven Crores Eighty-Three Lakhs Seventy-Seven Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-Five only) with request for conversion of the said 10,18,300 Share Warrants into 10,18,300 Equity Shares at a price of INR 155/- each.

ii. Change in Directors

During the financial year 2025-26, following changes were made in the Composition of Board of Directors of the Company: -

- (i) The Board of Directors at its meeting held on 13th August, 2025, considered and accepted the resignation of Mr. Kawaljeet Singh Bhatia (DIN: 00401827) from the position of Whole-time

Director of the Company with effect from the close of business hours on 13th August, 2025, in view of his desire to pursue an executive position in another company in the future. However, he continued to serve on board as a Promoter Non-Executive Non-Independent Director of Company liable to retire by rotation.

- (ii) On the recommendation of Nomination and Remuneration Committee, Adv. Deepika Sharma (DIN: 11543076) was appointed as an Additional Director in the category of Non-Executive Independent Woman Director by the Board of Directors at its Meeting held on 14th February, 2026 for a term of 5 (five) consecutive years commencing from 14th February, 2026 to 13th February, 2031. The said appointment was subsequently approved by the members through the postal ballot process by way of e-voting mechanism on 08th May, 2026.
- (iii) Mrs. Sherry Mac (DIN: 10736916) resigned from the position of the “Non-Executive Woman Independent Director” of the Company and consequently ceased to be a member of all the Committees of the Board with effect from close of business hours of 14th February, 2026. The Board places on record its deep appreciation of the valuable contribution made by her during her tenure as an Independent Director of the Company.

Further, during the current Financial Year 2026-27, on the recommendation of Nomination and Remuneration Committee, the Board of Directors at its meeting held on 13th August, 2026, considered and recommended re-appointment of Mr. Gaurav Chhabra (DIN: 09603279) as a Non-Executive Independent Director of the Company for a second term of five years with effect from 14th May, 2027 to 13th May, 2032 (both days inclusive), subject to the approval of members at the ensuing Annual General Meeting.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS REPORT

(a) Industry structure and developments

The Indian poultry industry continues to be one of the fastest-growing segments of the agricultural sector, driven by increasing demand for protein-rich diets, changing consumer preferences, urbanization and rising health consciousness. Poultry meat, particularly broiler chicken, continues to remain one of the most affordable sources of animal protein. India is among the world's leading producers of eggs and broiler meat.

The Indian poultry industry recorded steady growth during FY 2025-26, supported by healthy consumer demand for poultry products, increasing per capita protein consumption, rising rural demand and expanding organized retail and food service channels. During FY 2025-26, the industry demonstrated resilience despite challenges arising from fluctuations in feed ingredient prices, particularly maize and soybean meal, disease management concerns and changing market dynamics. Nevertheless, the industry's overall financial health remained stable, supported by prudent capacity expansion and sustained demand.

Looking ahead to FY 2026-27, the Indian poultry industry is expected to maintain steady growth, supported by robust demand fundamentals, improving realizations and continued expansion of organized poultry farming. Operating margins may improve moderately, subject to feed cost movements, market realizations and demand conditions. Volatility in feed prices and other disease outbreaks will continue to remain key monitorable factors for industry.

(b) Opportunities and Threats

The Indian poultry industry continues to offer significant growth opportunities, driven by increasing consumer preference for affordable and protein-rich food, rising per capita poultry consumption, growing population, increasing urbanization and greater awareness of the nutritional value of poultry products. Advancements in breeding practices, feed management, biosecurity measures, and farm automation continue to improve productivity, operational efficiency, and overall industry performance. The increasing adoption of contract farming and integrated poultry farming models also presents opportunities for sustainable growth and better resource utilization.

However, the industry continues to face several challenges, including volatility in the prices of key feed raw materials such as maize and soybean meal, disease outbreaks, adverse climatic conditions, increasing input costs, and fluctuations in market realizations of broilers. These factors have a direct bearing on production costs and profitability. Accordingly, effective cost management, robust biosecurity practices, efficient farm management, and prudent risk mitigation strategies remain critical for ensuring sustainable growth.

(c) Segment-wise or product-wise performance

The Company operates in a single business segment, namely poultry and poultry farming, and primarily deals in broilers. Accordingly, there are no separate reportable segments under this head. The financial performance of the Company is discussed in detail under Point (g) of this Management Discussion and Analysis Report.

(d) Industry Outlook

The long-term outlook for the Indian poultry industry continues to remain positive, supported by favourable demographic trends, increasing consumption of poultry products, rising income levels, and growing awareness regarding nutritional diets. The industry may, however, continue to experience short-term volatility in feed prices and seasonal demand patterns, disease-related risks and fluctuations in market realizations.

Over the medium to long term, the industry is expected to benefit from improved production efficiencies, increasing organized farming practises, modernization of infrastructure, and stronger supply chain networks. Continuous technological advancements, better disease management practices and increasing integration across the poultry value chain are expected to support the industry's growth

prospects.

(e) Risks and concerns

The poultry industry remains exposed to several operational and business risks. Disease outbreaks, volatility in feed raw material prices, adverse climatic conditions, fluctuations in poultry realizations and changes in government policies may adversely impact on Company's operations and profitability. Feed cost continues to constitute a significant portion of overall production expenses, making the business sensitive to changes in prices of feed ingredients such as maize and soybean meal. The Company is also exposed to regulatory changes, environmental compliance requirements and potential disruptions in the supply chain.

The Company continuously monitors these risks and has implemented appropriate mitigation measures, including stringent biosecurity protocols, vaccination programmes, prudent procurement practices, efficient feed management, insurance coverage, and continuous monitoring of market conditions to minimize operational disruptions and mitigate the potential impact of identified risks.

(f) Internal control systems and their adequacy

The Company has established adequate internal control systems commensurate with the size, nature and complexity of its business operations. These controls are designed to safeguard assets, ensure the accuracy and completeness of accounting records, promote operational efficiency, and ensure compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

The internal audit function periodically reviews the adequacy and effectiveness of internal controls and identify areas requiring improvement. The Audit Committee periodically reviews the adequacy and effectiveness of the internal control framework and monitors the implementation of audit recommendations. The Board is of the opinion that the Company's Internal Financial Controls are adequate and were operating effectively during FY 2025-26.

(g) Discussion on financial performance with respect to operational performance

The Standalone and Consolidated Financial Statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) prescribed under the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, read with the applicable provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Regulations issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI).

SIMRAN FARMS LIMITED, INDORE

During the year ended March 31, 2026, the Company achieved a total income of INR 87,718.38 Lakhs as against INR 83,624.22 Lakhs in the previous year, registering a steady growth in revenue. The Company earned a net profit (before Comprehensive Income) of INR 494.55 Lakhs as compared to INR 579.50 Lakhs in the previous year.

The increase in total income reflects sustained demand for the Company's products and continued growth in business operations. However, higher feed input costs, primarily on account of increased prices of maize and soybean meal, compressed operating margins during the year, resulting in lower profitability despite higher revenues. The Company continued to focus on operational efficiency, prudent cost management, improved farm productivity and effective resource utilization to mitigate the impact of rising input costs and maintain stable operations. The management remains committed to strengthening operational processes, enhancing productivity and pursuing sustainable long-term growth while effectively managing market and cost-related challenges.

(h) Material developments in Human Resources/Industrial Relations front, including number of people employed

The Company firmly believes that its employees are its most valuable asset and continues to focus on developing a skilled, motivated, and performance-oriented workforce. Regular training programmes covering farm management, biosecurity, health and safety, operational efficiency, and technical competencies were conducted during the year to enhance employee capabilities.

Industrial relations remained cordial and harmonious throughout FY 2025-26. The Company continued to maintain a healthy work environment by fostering employee engagement, ensuring compliance with applicable labour laws and promoting a culture of continuous learning and teamwork. As at March 31, 2026, the Company had 792 employees on its payroll.

Reason for change in Return on Net Worth: Return on Net Worth declined from 14.52% in FY 2024-25 to 8.71% in FY 2025-26 primarily due to a reduction in profit after tax during the year and a significant increase in shareholders' equity arising from the conversion of share warrants into equity shares, which also resulted in an increase in the securities premium account. Consequently, the increase in average net worth outpaced the earnings generated during the year, leading to a lower Return on Net Worth.

NOTES TO ACCOUNTS TO STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2026

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies

1.1 CORPORATE INFORMATION

Simran Farms Limited ("the Company") is a listed public company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956. Its equity shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange in India. The registered office of the company is located at 1-B, Vikas Rekha Complex, Khatiwala Tank, Indore, Madhya Pradesh, 452001.

The Company is engaged in the business of integrated poultry and poultry products. It is mainly focused on integration/contract farming with poultry farmers and consolidation of poultry activities and has also arranged its own manufacturing set-up for production of poultry feeds. Further, its breeding and integration farms have scientific rearing and balanced nutrition management for each bird.

1.2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

COMPLIANCE WITH IND-AS

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016.

CURRENT / NON-CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

All assets and liabilities have been classified and disclosed as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in division II of Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as up to twelve months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for the assets and liabilities that require measurement at fair value in accordance with Ind AS. The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees and all values are rounded to the nearest lakhs (INR 00,000), except otherwise indicated.

1.3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. **Key accounting estimates and judgments**

The preparation and presentation of financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period.

Although these estimates are based on the management's best knowledge of current events and actions, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in the outcomes requiring a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets or liabilities in future periods. Accounting estimates could change from period to period. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in the current and future periods, and if material, their effects are disclosed in the financial statements. Actual results could differ from the estimates. Any difference between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known/materialize.

Information about critical judgments in applying accounting policies, as well as estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are included in the following notes:

- i. Measurement of defined benefit obligations
- ii. Measurement and likelihood of occurrence of contingencies
- iii. Recognition of deferred tax assets

b. Inventories

Inventories are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value (except as otherwise stated) on an item- by-item basis, as under:

Raw materials, packing materials, stores and spares: Cost of inventory comprises all costs of purchase, duties and taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from tax authorities) and all other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Raw materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost. Cost is determined on a first-in first-out formula.

Work-in-progress and finished goods: Cost includes direct materials and costs of conversion in the form of labour and a systematic allocation of fixed and variable production overheads. It also includes other costs which are incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. The allocation of fixed production overheads is based on normal capacity of production. Cost is determined on first-in first-out formula. Realizable value of pre-determined normal rate of scrap is deducted from the cost of inventories. However, cost of inventories neither includes abnormal amounts of wasted material nor any scrap realizations there from.

By products and scrap are recognized at their net realizable value.

Stock-in-trade: Cost includes cost of purchases, duties and taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable from authorities) and other costs which are incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Cost is determined on a first-in first-out formula.

Parent Birds are sold as cull birds after losing its fertility and Commercial Birds are sold after they are grown up and ready for Consumption.

Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less the estimated costs of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

Cost of agricultural produce is deemed to be the fair value on the date of rise.

Cost of finished goods and work-in-progress include cost of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

c. Taxes

Current income tax

Current income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Current income tax relating to items recognized directly in equity is recognized in equity and not in the statement of profit and loss. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences, except when the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilized, except when the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax asset to be utilized. Unrecognized deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax relating to items recognized outside profit or loss is recognized outside profit or loss. Deferred tax items are recognized in correlation to the underlying transaction either in OCI or directly in equity.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred taxes relate to the same taxation authority.

Deferred tax assets include Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT) paid in accordance with the tax laws in India; to the extent it would be available for set off against future current income tax liability. Accordingly, MAT is recognized as deferred tax asset in the balance sheet when the asset can be measured reliably and it is probable that the future economic benefit associated with the asset will be realized.

d. Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Cost comprises of purchase price net of trade discounts and rebates, non- refundable duties and taxes, any directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. Cost also includes borrowing cost directly attributable to acquisition/ construction of a qualifying asset up to the date the asset is ready for its intended use. Subsequent expenditure on fixed assets is capitalized only if such expenditure results into an increase in the future benefits from such asset beyond its previously assessed standard of performance.

An item of property, plant and equipment and any significant part initially recognized is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the income statement when the asset is derecognized.

Capital work-in-progress comprises the cost of property, plant and equipment that are yet not ready for their intended use at the balance sheet date. The depreciable amount of a depreciable fixed asset is allocated on a systematic basis to each accounting period over the useful life of the asset. Management's estimate of useful life, which is duly supported by technical evidence, is as stipulated in Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013. The useful life is for the whole of the asset, except where cost of a part of the asset is significant to total cost of the asset and useful life of that part is different from the useful life of the remaining asset, useful life of that significant part ("component") is determined separately and the depreciable amount of the said component is depreciated is allocated on a systematic basis to each accounting period during the useful life of the asset.

In arriving at the depreciable amount, residual value in case of certain assets are considered to be more than 5% of the original cost, this estimate of residual value is duly supported by technical advice. Depreciation on assets acquired during the year is calculated on a pro-rata basis from the date of addition. Similarly, depreciation on assets sold, discarded, demolished or destroyed during the year is also calculated on a pro rata basis up to the date on which such asset has been sold, discarded, demolished or destroyed. Depreciable assets costing up to Rupees 5,000/- are depreciated fully in the year of acquisition. The residual values, useful

lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

e. Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

f. Trade receivables

Trade receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment.

g. Leases

IND-AS 116 "Leases" is mandatory for the accounting period commencing on and from 1st April 2019, and has replaced the existing IND-AS 17 relating to leases. We have applied the modified retrospective approach, for which no significant adjustments were required to be made to the retained earnings as at 1st April 2019. However, no material lease has been recognized for the year ending March 31, 2026.

h. Employee Benefits

Short term employee benefits

All employee benefits which fall due wholly within twelve months after the end of the period in which employee renders the related service are classified as short-term employee benefits. Undiscounted value of short term benefits such as salaries, wages, bonus and ex-gratia are recognized in the period in which the employee renders the related service.

Defined Contribution Plans:

The Company's Employee's Provident Fund scheme, Employee's State Insurance Scheme and Employee's Superannuation Scheme are defined contribution plans. The Company's contribution payable under the schemes is recognized as an expense in the statement of profit and loss during the period in which the employee renders the related service.

Defined benefit plan Gratuity

The Company operates a defined benefit gratuity plan, which requires contributions to be made to a separately administered fund. The defined benefit plan surplus or deficit on the balance sheet comprises the total for each of the fair value of plan assets less the present value of the defined liabilities. The cost of providing benefits under the defined benefit plan is determined based on independent actuarial valuation using the projected unit credit method. The gratuity liability is measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows. The discount rates used for determining the present value of the obligation under defined benefit plan, is based on the market yield on government securities as at the balance sheet date.

Re-measurements, comprising of actuarial gains and losses, the effect of the asset ceiling, excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability and the return on plan assets (excluding amounts included in net interest on the net defined benefit liability), are recognized immediately in the balance sheet with a corresponding debit or credit to retained earnings through OCI in the period in which they occur. Re-measurements are not reclassified to profit or loss in subsequent periods

Past service costs are recognized in profit or loss on the earlier of:

The date of the plan amendment or curtailment, and

The date that the Group recognizes related restructuring cost

Net interest is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net defined benefit liability or asset.

The Company recognizes the following changes in the net defined benefit obligation as an expense in the statement of profit and loss.

Service costs comprising current service costs, past-service costs, gains and losses on curtailments and non-

routine settlements, and Net interest expense or income.

Other Long term employee benefit

Entitlement to annual leave is recognized when they accrue to employees. Annual leave can either be availed or en-cashed subject to a restriction on the maximum number of leaves. The liability is determined and provided during the year.

i. Earnings Per Share

Earnings per share (EPS) is calculated by dividing the net profit for the year attributable to the equity shareholders by weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit for the period attributable to equity shareholders and weighted average number of shares outstanding during the period is adjusted for the effects of all diluted potential equity shares.

j. Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

The Company assesses, at each reporting date, whether there is an indication that an asset maybe impaired. If any indication exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required, the Company estimates the asset's recoverable amount. An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's or cash-generating units (CGU) fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use. Recoverable amount is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or groups of assets. When the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs of disposal, recent market transactions are considered. If no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate evaluation model is used. These calculations are corroborated by valuation multiples or other available fair value indicators.

k. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets and Commitments

Provisions are recognized when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. When the Company expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset, but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain. The expense relating to a provision is presented in the statement of profit and loss net of any reimbursement.

A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is possible obligation or a obligation that may, but probably will not require an outflow of resources embodying the economic benefits or the amount of such obligation cannot be measured reliably. When there is possible obligation or a present obligation in respect of which likelihood of outflow of resources embodying the economic benefits is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Contingent assets are not recognized. However, when the realization of income is virtually certain, then the related asset is no longer a contingent asset, and is recognized as an asset.

Commitments are future liabilities for contractual expenditure, classified and disclosed as estimated amount of contracts remaining to be extracted on capital account and not provided for.

l. Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of returns, trade discount or rebates. The Company recognizes revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured and it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the Company.

Revenue from Sale of goods

Revenues from sales of goods are recognized upon transfer of control of promised goods to customer, which

are generally on dispatch of goods and the customer has accepted the products in accordance with the agreed terms. There is no continuing managerial involvement with the goods and the Company retains no effective control of goods transferred to a degree usually associated with ownership. Revenue from sales of goods is based on the price quoted in the market or price specified in the sales contracts.

m. Other Income

Other Income is comprised primarily of interest income, Rearing charges. Interest income is recognized on accrual basis. Rearing charges are recognized when right to receive is established.

n. Measurement of fair values

The Company's accounting policies and disclosures require the measurement of fair values for, both financial and non-financial assets and liabilities. When measuring the fair value of a financial asset or a financial liability, the Company uses observable market data as far as possible. Fair values are categorized into different levels in a fair value hierarchy based on the inputs used in the valuation techniques as follows.

- Level 1: quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices).
- Level 3: inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

If the inputs used to measure the fair value of an asset or a liability fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, then the fair value measurement is categorized in its entirety in the same level of the fair value hierarchy as the lowest level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

The Company recognizes transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy at the end of the reporting period during which the change has occurred.

o. Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. Financial instruments also include derivative contracts such as foreign currency foreign exchange forward contracts and commodity futures contracts.

Financial instruments also cover contracts to buy or sell a non-financial item that can be settled net in cash or another financial instrument, or by exchanging financial instruments, as if the contracts were financial instruments, with the exception of contracts that were entered into and continue to be held for the purpose of the receipt or delivery of a non-financial item in accordance with the entity's expected purchase, sale or usage requirements.

Financial assets

Classification

The Company classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- Where assets are measured at fair value, gains and losses are either recognized entirely in the Statement of Profit and Loss (i.e. fair value through profit or loss), or recognized in Other Comprehensive Income (i.e. fair value through other comprehensive income), where permissible.
- A financial asset that meets the following two conditions is measured at amortized cost (net of any write down for impairment) unless the asset is designated at fair value through profit or loss under the fair value option.

Business model test: The objective of the Company's business model is to hold the financial asset to collect the contractual cash flows (rather than to sell the instrument prior to its contractual maturity to realize its fair value changes).

Cash flow characteristics test: The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to

cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Initial recognition & measurement at initial recognition, the Company measures a financial asset at fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not recorded at fair value through the Statement of Profit or Loss, transaction costs that are attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. However, trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Equity investments (other than investments in subsidiaries, associates and joint venture)

- All equity investments in scope of Ind-AS 109 are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading are classified as at FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Company decides to classify the same either as at FVOCI or FVTPL. The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition and is irrevocable.
- If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as FVOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognized in the OCI. There is no recycling of the amounts from OCI to profit and loss, even on sale of investment. However, the Company may transfer the cumulative gain or loss within equity.
- Equity instruments included within the FVTPL category are measured at fair value with all changes recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Investments in Subsidiaries, Associates & Joint Ventures:

Investments in subsidiaries, associates & joint ventures are measured at FVTPL, if any.

Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind-AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- a) financial assets that are debt instruments, and are measured at amortized cost e.g., loans, deposits and bank balance.
- b) trade receivables – the company uses Provision matrix which is a Practical expedient as provided under IND AS 109 for measuring Expected Credit Loss. To apply such matrix the receivables are grouped into segments, customer rating and type of customer. To calibrate the matrix, the company uses historically observed default rates over the expected life of trade receivables and is adjusted for forward looking estimates. At every reporting date, the historical observed default rates are updated and changes in the forward looking estimates are analysed.

Derecognition

A financial asset (or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a Company of similar financial assets) is primarily derecognized (i.e. removed from the Company's Statement of Assets and Liabilities) when:

- i. The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or
- ii. The Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party under a 'pass-through' arrangement; and either (a) the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or (b) the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

When the Company has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from an asset or has entered into a pass-through arrangement, it evaluates if and to what extent it has retained the risks and rewards of ownership. When it has neither transferred nor retained substantially all of the risks and rewards of the asset, nor transferred control of the asset, the Company continues to recognize the transferred asset to the extent of the Company's continuing involvement. In that case, the Company also recognizes an associated liability. The transferred asset and the associated liability are measured on a basis that reflects the rights and obligations

that the Company has retained.

Continuing involvement that takes the form of a guarantee over the transferred asset is measured at the lower of the original carrying amount of the asset and the maximum amount of consideration that the Company could be required to repay.

Financial liabilities

Classification

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by the Company are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

The Company classifies all financial liabilities as subsequently measured at amortized cost, except for financial liabilities at fair value through the Statement of Profit and Loss. Such liabilities, including derivatives that are liabilities, shall be subsequently measured at fair value.

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables, or as derivatives designated as hedging instruments in an effective hedge, as appropriate.

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable and incremental transaction cost.

Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the Effective Interest Rate (EIR). The EIR amortization is included as finance costs in the statement of profit and loss.

The Company's financial liabilities include trade and other payables, acceptances, loans and borrowings including bank overdrafts, financial guarantee contracts and derivative financial instruments.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the statement of profit and loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

p. Borrowings

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method. Gains and losses are recognized in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognized as well as the effective interest rate amortization process.

Amortized cost is calculated by considering any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. The effective interest rate amortization is included as finance cost in the statement of profit and loss.

q. Segment Reporting

An entity shall disclose information to enable users of its financial statements to evaluate the nature and financial effects of the business activities in which it engages and the economic environments in which it operates.

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the management of the company.

The company has been primarily engaged in Poultry Breeding & Farming activities only. As such there is no identifiable operating segment, hence there is nothing to disclose under INDAS-108 'Operating Segment'.

r. Corporate Social Responsibility

Section 135 of the Companies Act, 2013 mandates every company having minimum threshold limit of net worth, turnover or net profit as prescribed to constitute a Corporate Social Responsibility Committee of the Board, formulation of a Corporate Social Responsibility Policy that shall indicate the activities to be undertaken by the Company as specified in Schedule VII to the Companies Act, 2013 and duly approved by the Board, fix the amount of expenditure to be incurred on the activities and monitor the CSR Policy from time to time.

In line with Companies Act, 2013 Corporate Social Responsibility is applicable to the company for the financial year 2025-26.

s. Long Term Contracts

The Group has a process whereby periodically all long-term contracts are assessed for material foreseeable losses. At the year-end, the Group has reviewed all such contracts and confirmed that no provision is required to be created under any law / accounting standard towards any foreseeable loss.

Share Warrants

At the time of issuance of the aforesaid share warrants, the Company had received an amount of Rs. 3,94,59,125/- , being 25% of the total share warrants consideration, in accordance with the applicable regulatory (SEBI) requirements. During the year, the warrant holders exercised their option for conversion of warrants into equity shares and the Company received the balance amount of Rs. 11,83,77,375/- on 25th March 2026, equivalent to the remaining 75% of the share warrants consideration. Subsequent upon receipt of the balance amount and the exercise of conversion rights by the warrant holders, the Board of Directors at its meeting held on 30th March 2026 approved the allotment of 10,18,300 fully paid-up equity shares to the respective warrant holders mentioned in Board Resolution passed on date of allotment of Share Warrants."

At the time of issuance of the aforesaid share warrants, the Company had received an amount of Rs. 3,94,59,125/- , being 25% of the total share warrants consideration, in accordance with the applicable regulatory (SEBI) requirements. During the year, the warrant holders exercised their option for conversion of warrants into equity shares and the Company received the balance amount of Rs. 11,83,77,375/- on 25th March 2026, equivalent to the remaining 75% of the share warrants consideration.

Subsequent upon receipt of the balance amount and the exercise of conversion rights by the warrant holders, the Board of Directors at its meeting held on 30th March 2026 approved the allotment of 10,18,300 fully paid-up equity shares to the respective warrant holders mentioned in Board Resolution passed on date of allotment of Share Warrants.

The equity shares allotted pursuant to conversion of warrants rank pari-passu in all respects with the existing equity shares of the Company, including dividend entitlement and other corporate benefits, if any. Accordingly, the issued, subscribed and paid-up equity share capital of the Company stands increased to that extent.

Note 32: FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

Financial risk factors

This note presents information about the Company's exposure to financial risks, the Company's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing these risks and the Company's management of capital.

The Company's financial instruments consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents, trade and other receivables and payables and long term and short term borrowings. In the normal course of business, the Company is exposed to credit, liquidity and market risk.

The Board has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities. The Company, through its training, management standards and procedures, aims to develop a disciplined and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations.

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's trade and other receivables. The carrying amounts of financial assets represent the maximum credit risk exposure.

Trade receivables are derived from revenue earned from customers located in India. Credit risk has always been managed by the Company through credit approvals, establishing credit limits and continuously monitoring the creditworthiness of customers to which the Company grants credit terms in the normal course of business.

Credit risk on cash and cash equivalents is assessed as low risk as the Company deposits cash surpluses with financial institutions of high quality and standing.

The Company has used expected credit loss (ECL) model for assessing the impairment loss. For this purpose, the Company uses a provision matrix to compute the expected credit loss amount. The provision matrix takes into account external and internal risk factors and historical data of credit losses from various customers.

Other receivables consist primarily of security deposits, advances to employees and other receivables.

The risk of default is assessed as low.

Liquidity risk

The Company actively monitors its cash flows to ensure there is sufficient cash available to meet its working capital requirements. Due to the dynamic nature of the underlying businesses, the Company maintains flexibility in funding by maintaining availability under committed credit lines. Management monitors rolling forecasts of the Company's cash and cash equivalents on the basis of expected cash flow.

Market risk

Interest rate risk

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk on its cash and cash equivalents, long-term loans and borrowings, which can have an impact on the cash flows of these instruments. The exposure to interest rate risk is managed through the Company's Board by using counterparties that offer the best rates which enables the Company to maximise returns whilst minimising risk.

Interest is paid on monthly basis based on the actual interest rate prevailing during the month. Hence, the Company is not significantly exposed to interest rate risk on such borrowings.

Capital risk management

The Board's policy is to maintain a strong capital base so as to maintain shareholder, creditor and market confidence and to sustain the future development needs of the business. The Board monitors both the spread of shareholders return on equity (which is defined as profit for the year expressed as a percentage of average total equity) and the level of dividends paid to shareholders. There were no changes to the Company's approach to capital management during the

year.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH,2025****Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies****1.1 CORPORATE INFORMATION**

The Consolidated Financial Statements comprises Financial Statements **Simran Farms Limited** (the Company) and its Subsidiary **Puregene Biotech Limited** (Collectively, the Group) for the year ended 31st March, 2026. Simran Farms Limited ("the Company") is a listed public company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act, 1956. Its equity shares are listed on Bombay Stock Exchange in India. The registered office of the company is located at 1-B, Vikas Rekha Complex, Khatiwala Tank, Indore, Madhya Pradesh, 452001.

The Company is engaged in the business of integrated poultry and poultry products. It is mainly focused on integration/contract farming with poultry farmers and consolidation of poultry activities and has also arranged its own manufacturing set-up for production of poultry feeds. Further, its breeding and integration farms have scientific rearing and balanced nutrition management for each bird.

1.2 BASIS OF PREPARATION**COMPLIANCE WITH IND-AS**

The financial statements of the Group have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards ("Ind AS") as notified by Ministry of Corporate Affairs pursuant to section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amendment Rules, 2016.

CURRENT / NON-CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

All assets and liabilities have been classified and disclosed as current or non-current as per the Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in division II of Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as up to twelve months for the purpose of current or non-current classification of assets and liabilities.

BASIS OF MEASUREMENT

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for the assets and liabilities that require measurement at fair value in accordance with Ind AS. The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees and all values are rounded to the nearest lakhs (INR 00,000), except otherwise indicated.

1.3 PRINCIPLES OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements relate to Simran Farms Limited ("the company") and its subsidiary company. The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the following basis:

- a. The financial statements of the company and its subsidiaries are combined on a line-by-line basis by adding together like terms of assets, liabilities, equity, Incomes, expenses, and cash flows, after fully eliminating intra-group balances and intra- group transactions.
- b. Profits or losses resulting from intra-group transactions that are recognized in assets, such as inventory and property, plant & equipment, are eliminated full.
- c. Offset (eliminate) the carrying amount of the parent's investment in each subsidiary and the parent's

portion of equity of each subsidiary.

- d. non-controlling interest's share of profit/loss of consolidated subsidiaries for the year is identified and adjusted against the income of the group in order to arrive at the net income attributable to shareholders of the company.
- e. non-controlling interest's share of net assets of consolidated subsidiaries is identified and presented in the Consolidated Balance sheet separate from liabilities and the equity of the company's shareholders.

Investment Allowance Reserve

Investment Allowance Reserve is created due to tax incentive to encourage investment in plant and machinery. It is used as deduction while computing business income under the Income Tax, 1961.

Retained Earnings

Retained earnings are the profits that the Company has earned till date, less any transfers to general reserve, dividends or other distributions paid to shareholders.

Note 32: FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

Financial risk factors

This note presents information about the Company's exposure to financial risks, the Company's objectives, policies and processes for measuring and managing these risks and the Company's management of capital.

The Company's financial instruments consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents, trade and other receivables and payables and long term and short term borrowings. In the normal course of business, the Company is exposed to credit, liquidity and market risk.

The Board has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework.

The Company's risk management policies are established to identify and analyze the risks faced by the Company, to set appropriate risk limits and controls and to monitor risks and adherence to limits. Risk management policies and systems are reviewed regularly to reflect changes in market conditions and the Company's activities. The Company, through its training, management standards and procedures, aims to develop a disciplined and constructive control environment in which all employees understand their roles and obligations.

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instrument fails to meet

its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's trade and other receivables. The carrying amounts of financial assets represent the maximum credit risk exposure.

Trade receivables are derived from revenue earned from customers located in India. Credit risk has always been managed by the Company through credit approvals, establishing credit limits and continuously monitoring the creditworthiness of customers to which the Company grants credit terms in the normal course of business.

Credit risk on cash and cash equivalents is assessed as low risk as the Company deposits cash surpluses with financial institutions of high quality and standing.

The Company has used expected credit loss (ECL) model for assessing the impairment loss. For this purpose, the Company uses a provision matrix to compute the expected credit loss amount. The provision matrix takes into account external and internal risk factors and historical data of credit losses from various customers.

Other receivables consist primarily of security deposits, advances to employees and other receivables.

The risk of default is assessed as low.

Liquidity risk

The Company actively monitors its cash flows to ensure there is sufficient cash available to meet its working capital requirements. Due to the dynamic nature of the underlying businesses, the Company maintains flexibility in funding by maintaining availability under committed credit lines. Management monitors rolling forecasts of the Company's cash and cash equivalents on the basis of expected cash flow. The table below summarises the maturity profile of the Company's financial liabilities as at 31st March 2026 based on contractual undiscounted payments:

Market risk

Interest rate risk

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk on its cash and cash equivalents, long-term loans and borrowings, which can have an impact on the cash flows of these instruments. The exposure to interest rate risk is managed through the Company's Board by using counterparties that offer the best rates which enables the Company to maximise returns whilst minimising risk.

Interest is paid on monthly basis based on the actual interest rate prevailing during the month. Hence, the Company is not significantly exposed to interest rate risk on such borrowings.

Capital risk management

The Board's policy is to maintain a strong capital base so as to maintain shareholder, creditor and market confidence and to sustain the future development needs of the business. The Board monitors both the spread of shareholders return on equity (which is defined as profit for the year expressed as a percentage of average total equity) and the level of dividends paid to shareholders. There were no changes to the Company's approach to capital management during the year. Total Equity includes General Reserve, Securities Premium, Investment allowance reserves, Retained Earnings and Share Capital. Total Debt includes current debt plus non-current debt.
